Templar Knights in history

Guillaume de Beaujeau was the 20th Grand Master of the Knights Templar from 1273-1291. He fought bravely and died during the siege of Acre in 1291. Legend has it; de Beaujeau threw his sword down and proceeded to walk away from the front lines. When questioned as to why he was fleeing, the Grand Master replied, I am not fleeing, I am dead. De Beaujeau's death sealed the fate of the city and Acre was lost to the Crusaders forever.

Prelate's Message

“At that time Jesus went through the grainfields on the sabbath; his disciples were hungry, and they began to pluck heads of grain and to eat.” Matthew 12:1 Revised Standard Version

September brings with it a feeling of change. School buses once again make regular appearances on our streets, shops begin selling apple cider and pumpkin flavored everything, and the air takes on the first signs of the autumn chill. In times gone by, we would all be making preparations for the yearly harvest.

Our modern world affords us the convenience of having just about any product we could want at the click of a button and at any time of year, food included. Because of this, we have lost some of our connection with this turning of the seasons and instinctually knowing when it is time to gather. In many ways, harvest time has become, all the time.

This is not unlike what is happening in this passage from Matthew. Jesus is leading his disciples through a grainfield, and they begin to pluck the seeds and eat them, but they do so on the Sabbath, which is not the proper time. This causes some argument, and Jesus defends the disciples, pointing out that even King David's men ate what was not allowed when they hungry.

Jesus is declaring that harvest time is all the time. Of course, he is not referring to grain or any other product, but the harvest of souls.

With this expansion of when we can harvest, comes the responsibility to, like the disciples, harvest when it is needed. As followers of the cross, we should always be ready to share the message of the Gospel, to lend assistance, or to offer counsel and support, to our fellows and to those who are not yet in the fold.

The challenge for us all is to recognize when these opportunities present themselves.

It would be nice if those who were ready for the harvest stood up and waved their hands like the grain the disciples plucked, but it is far more likely that someone who needs to encounter the Word of God, will be hidden and concealed.

This makes it all the more important that we carry our personal banners of faith high and unfurled. To serve as a sign that we are ready for the harvest that is put in front of us, and when we do see that hand go up, reaching out for the help that only Jesus can give, we reach our ourselves to be his hands in the world.

In this way, we can fulfill the duties that we are given, and be a blessing to our fellow man and the world.
