In the summer months, we spend more time outside on picnics, projects, and vacations. Studies show that long-term exposure to bright sunlight may increase the risk of cataracts and growths of the eye, including cancer. Ultraviolet rays reflected off surfaces such as sand and water can cause eyes to sunburn, potentially resulting in temporary blindness in just a few hours. As July is Ultraviolet Safety Month, the American Academy of Ophthalmology reminds us of the importance of shielding our eyes from the sun's harmful rays with 100% UV-blocking sunglasses and broad-brimmed hats.

Of note is the Battle of Gettysburg that took place on July 1-3, 1863, during the American Civil War. It is known to be the bloodiest battle of the Civil War with casualties exceeding 50,000 on both sides. The fields of Gettysburg witnessed this tragic spectacle where countless numbers of soldiers made the ultimate sacrifice in service of their respective causes. It was also this battle that inspired one of the most iconic speeches in American history, Abraham Lincoln's "Gettysburg Address".

Independence Day is an important federal holiday in the United States that commemorates the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. The day marks the historical event when the United States of America declared its independence from Great Britain. The vote on the Declaration of Independence was taken on July 2nd, formally adopted, and dated as July 4th, when the formal signing began on August 2nd. Happy 248th birthday America!

Every July begins with a wonderful holiday in the United States, as we celebrate the anniversary of the proclamation of the Declaration of Independence. On July 4 in 1776 the Continental Congress declared that there were no longer colonies of Great Britain but free and independent states.

The state house bell which called those delegates and citizens together for the proclamation was not then known as the Liberty Bell. It acquired that moniker years later when people remembered the latter portion of the scripture verse that was also inscribed on it "Unto All the People'. Lev. 25:10c. Abolitionists coined the term, the Liberty Bell, to call out the need for the fullest sense of that scripture verse. All people were to be set free in the year of jubilee! Liberty was not to be enjoyed only by the well off, those who owned property, or those in power. Liberty was the birthright of all citizens of the land, and none should be enslaved.

In the many years since 1776 or even 1865 we continue to live into the meaning of liberty. Decade by decade, often only through immense struggle and sacrifice, our country has learned that our precious liberty is not to be hoarded but to be shared freely with all parts of our society and to the world at large. Our liberty has drawn people from around the globe for hundreds of years, who yearn for freedom from oppression. Most of us who are currently citizens are here because our ancestors yearned for liberty from want, from the oppression of their religion, from lack of freedom to choose their own government, etc.
