## Associate Grand Prelate's Message

*Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God; consider the outcome of their life, and imitate their faith.* Hebrews 13:7

Fraters,

As we enter the month of February, our nation pauses to remember individuals whose lives and examples helped shape a more just, more hopeful world. I think especially of George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, (I would include the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. having just been honored in late January.) These men differed greatly in background, temperament, and circumstance, yet each rose to meet the moral demands of his time with courage, restraint, and a deep sense of responsibility to something greater than himself.

Whether or not they held formal Masonic membership, each embodied principles that the Craft has long sought to cultivate integrity, humility, perseverance, and a willingness to sacrifice personal comfort for the common good. More importantly still, each grounded those virtues in an explicit moral vision shaped by Christian faith and Scripture. Their lives remind us that faith is not merely confessed with the lips, but proven through action, especially when action is costly.

Washington understood leadership as stewardship. He resisted the temptation of power, choosing instead the harder path of restraint and service. Lincoln bore the weight of national suffering with profound seriousness, refusing easy answers and speaking often of divine judgment, mercy, and the moral law that stands over nations and individuals alike. Dr. King, drawing deeply from the prophets and the Gospels, insisted that justice, love, and reconciliation were not optional ideals, but divine commands that demanded faithful obedience even in the face of violence and hatred.

The Epistles to the Hebrews instructs us not simply to admire our leaders, but to *consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith.* That distinction matters. Admiration alone changes nothing. Emulation, however, transforms both the one who imitates and the community shaped by that imitation.

For us as Sir Knights, this month offers more than an opportunity for remembrance; it presents a summons to reflection. What was it about these men that makes them worthy of honor generations later? Where did they show moral courage when silence would have been safer? How did they hold together conviction and charity, firmness, and humility? And perhaps most uncomfortably, where are we being called to embody those same virtues in our own lives?

Each of us has our own heroes, parents, pastors, mentors, teachers, or faithful friends, whose quiet examples shaped us more deeply than public monuments ever could. Take time this month to name those figures, to give thanks for them, and to ask what their lives still teach you. Then ask the harder question: *Who is watching me?* What habits, convictions, and acts of faith am I modeling for those who will come after?

The measure of our reverence for heroes is not found in words or ceremonies, but in whether we allow their example to refine our own character. May we, by God's grace, become men whose lives are worth remembering—not for our own glory, but for the good of those we are called to serve.
